SECOND XI REPORT

This season saw NBMCC win its third senior premiership the first by a second eleven. There is no doubting the fact that it was well deserved.

Undefeated at Christmas, we went on to finish the year with ten victories,

two defeats and one draw for a total of 65 points.

Having lost 1975/76s leading wicket taker Rob Coombs, century maker Col Hosking and Trevor Baxter from our lineup before the season got underway, we were left with a few gaps to fill. After the first few matches however, their replacements seemed more than adequate. Michael Walsh rejoined the club, Ian Toogood was dragged from an early retirement, and a rising star in the person of Carey Meadows appeared on the horizon. All looked well.

Ed Irons relished the opportunity to spearhead the attack this season, and after a fine 8 for 25 in his first bowling spell of the season settled down to some destructive bowling which had netted him 56 wickets by the end of March. It is of particular comfort to a captain to have a bowler

of such determination and experience on ready call.

In the second game Mike Walsh collected a match winning six wickets against C2s most unpleasant team, and then continued to bowl consistently throughout the season, providing valuable support for Md. Chris Byrne again filled the role of third seamer and at times worked up a good deal of pace - he bowled one amazing ball to his little brother in the game against the Baps, that Dennis Lillee would have been proud of.

Once again the spinning department had its good days and its bad days, but we were fortunate to have backup bowling talent in the persons of Rob Hands, Graig Pittard and later, Phil Chapman. Ian Toogood could always be depended on to introduce a bit of variety at five to six on the second day.

Our talented batting lineup knocked up some record scores this year, and provided much entertainment Three times the opening partnership exceeded the hundred mark, and there were also century partnerships for the third and sixth wickets. Seven of our completed innings totalled over 200 - but we saved up our best performances for the finals. Totals of 5/368 and 330 were a good way to finish the season.

Mike Walsh proved in the finals that he has the potential for producing valuable batting performances. Too often this season he was frustrated out by being at the wrong end of the wicket while the ball was being slathered by his strike begging appropriate the wicket while the ball was being slathered

Consistent batting efforts were provided by both Mike Hill and Carey Meadows, with carey also injecting a bit of class into the order. Mike's patience paid dividends this season in the game against the Baps at the High School, when faced by grass a foot long he didn't allow the conditions to daunt him and scored a valuable half century.

The batting surprise of the season was Reb Hands, whose sensible knocks at crucial moments showed great promise. Unfortunately, Byrney couldn't quite recapture his batting form of the previous season - but at least his

mind was on the job.

Ian Toogood added the necessary experience to the batting this year, and several times guided us to victory - similarly, Phil Chapman, on his return to the club after Christmas steadied things down and showed us some shots we didn't even know he had. Who can forget the two lofted fours off the last two balls of the day in the final - to bring up his ton.

The lower part of the order didn't get much of a look in this year, but I'm sure they are all capable batsmen.

Our fielding ran hot and cold this season, but even when it was cold it was clearly a notch above most other teams. Ian looked after the off side this season, and although he didn't throw down the stumps as often as usual, he did scoop up some amazing catches. Carey also took a few screamers in the gully, and Ed did a great job in the batsmen's hip pockets. Rod Clarke also proved himself a valuable part of our fielding machine with his safe pair of hands and accurate returns.

Fortunately the wicket keeping department caused few worries this season

as Paul Bowden continued to improve behind the stumps.

1976/77 was a very satisfying year for me. By task as captain was made easy, thanks largely to the support of our vice-captain Ed, and everyone else who offered advice. Thanks also to our few, but regular supporters and to everyone else who contributed to a fine season. We are now aiming to have two sides in 'A' grade for the 1930/81 season.

UNDER 16 GRADE REPORT

The Under 16s this year produced a very similar effort to that of last season. Although loaded with talent, they ravely blended to produce a great team effort indicative of their potential. Although they lost only two matches, statistically the team faired only marginally better than their opponents. However 1976/77 was not without its good points; and most importantly, all the players enjoyed their cricket.

In mid-October we had an unusually long list of players, but by the time the finals came around, the original 16 had settled into a more comfortable dozen. Captained by Glen Dugdale, the team reached the Christmas break with only one loss - but owing to bad weather and a forfeit, we only played one morning of cricket between December and March. Consequently we went into the semi lacking a little in the way of match practice - and duly suffered.

The season couldn't have got off to a more exciting start - we won the first two matches by the smallest possible margin. Against Kerrimuir Glen Dugdale dominated with five wiskets and 71 runs out of a total of 110, but Gary Rutherford was the hero of the game's last moments, capturing the final two wickets in successive balls, with Kerrimuirs total on 109.

Some tight bowling allowed us to hold Blackburn South, out by one run, but we had our first defeat at the hands of Gibbsy's mob. Although beaten, the game did have its bright spots. Two new batting talents established themselves - Glen Weatherley and wicketkeeper bark Barrett. Both boys were to become our most consistent run scorers during the season.

A steady half century by Mark, and a fine 37 not out by another promising cricketer, Frank Caldwell enabled us to add almost sixty runs for the eighth wicket in our match against All Saints - a game which also provided Greg Farrell with his best bowling performance for the season, 4 for 17.

Against Blacky Baps, yet another batting talent emerged in Brad Liddle. Brad's 45 held our innings together and helped us on the way to another victory. Opening bowler Ray Lehman wrapped things up when he bowled the last three opposition batsmen in the space of one maiden over.

The game against Ashburton Pres. also had its interest. Although Glen Dugdale's bowling was not always accurate this season, there was nodoubting his effectiveness as a shock bowler - just ask Ashburton's opener. Another bowler who caused a few shocks was Steven Down. Steve's rather innocuous looking deliveries turned into very effective leg-cutters which netted him three wickets.

Our one pre finals/post Christmas match was another thriller; not content merely to beat Trollop's gang by one run in the second match, we thought we'd prove the point and beat them again - by one run.

Batting first, we only managed 71 in our eighteen overs, but some aggressive (almost violent) bowling by our captain and a great effort by Mark Droscher left Blacky South one run short once again. Not content with his two wickets, Bark decided he would hurry things along and tried to run out the past of the transfer.

out the rest of the team - and he very nearly did.

It was in the semi final against Trinity down at Frog Hollow that Mark broscher finally came good with the bat. Sent in to open for the first time he proceeded to play the defiant opener role and hung around for ages scoring ten singles while his captain put together an amazingly disciplined 63. Then he went beserk hitting 18 runs off one over and finishing with 40 valuable runs. A rear guard action by Ross Boucher, ray Lehman and Tom Honan enabled us to finish the day with a comfortable 221 runs. The next week is best forgotten. Batting three short, Trinity replied with 238. The best excuse I can think of is that the prospects of a long weekend down the beach caused too many minds to wander.

With all the potential in this years team, a third senior eleven next

season should be well served.
