Without a doubt the strongest bowling team in their grade, it was also one of the youngest with an average age of around 20 . As with the firsts, the most satisfying feature of the seconds was seeing the young players continue to develop and inprove (Jin even learnt how to keep to spin). To finish on top after the home and away games and eventually lose the Final by just 6 runs was a fine performance by a team which had 10 't 3 of the first 4 matches and was forced to adjust to three captains during the season.

The Third XI again presented a problem, Attitude and behaviour were lesser issues this season (no reports!) with one or two exceptions. This time it was on field performances which were the main area of concern. Naturally the highlight of the year was the day when D grade won a game - the most embarassing moment came when they were defeated outright in a one day game. In their favour, it must be said that the team was consistent collecting totals of between 70 and 80 with monotonous regularity. Also in their favour was the average age of the team - about 17 on a cood day. If we had been able to provide the thirds with a couple of experienced batsmen each week the results would have been very different, Sympathy and thanks must go to skipper Mark. Pryn who must have come close to a nervous breakdown on more than one oc $c_{5}$ sion.

The Junior teams provided contrasting pictures this season. With the graduatim en masse of almost the entire 1979/80 $\mathrm{J} / 14$ team into Under 16 ranks it was back to square one for the younger team. It took a while, but thanks to the Hands brothers and some interschool recruiting the team developed fairly well, as well as throwing up some talented stars of the future. On the other hand the Under 16 s started with more than enough and maintained a comfortable squad of 13 for most of the season. Consistent performances before Christmas raised them to the top of the B Zone ladder where they stayed until a badly timed slump left them spectators for the Grand Final.

Plans to improve our practice facilities in $1980 / 81 \mathrm{fell}$ ing a heap after the local council failed to make up its collective mind wout the form and location of two new practice wickets. By the time some sort of decision was eventually reached we discovered that we had run out of money. So that was that.

2nd XI REPORT. The seconds finished the season at the top of the Cl Grade. ladder, winning 8 of 11 games and carning promotion to B2 and an opportunity to prove ourselves in the final series. The team lineup remained relatively stable throughout the season, however only two of the 29 players used, Jim Phillips and David Hands, played in every match.

We opened the season with a 100 run defeat at the hands of All Saints - who were, eventually to be our opposition in the Final. Craig Rowbotham captured 4/79, Dave Hands put in one of his 20 over marathons, and Steve (U16) Pollard made his senior debut with $3 / 61$. Only Richard Stone's 117 x looked convincing in our score of $5 / 178$.

The tables, were turned however in the second round against Deepdene. Russell Davison began his season with $4 / 34$ and Craig continued his good form to dismiss Rinny and the boys for 159 . At $5 / 71$ we were looking rather shaky, but David Hands, supported by Mark Droscher (30) Craig (21) and Ross (also U16) McDonald $\mathbf{6 2 5 x}$ ) steered us to victory with a commanding innings of 101 x .

Dick finally relented to pressure from his fellow selectors and took his place in A grade for rcund 3, leaving Russell to take over the leadership against the Barneys. John Tamblyn joined us to take $5 / 45$ with the new ball and help dismiss St.Barnabas for only 100. Unfortunately we cculd only manage 34 in reply. Top scorer was another visitor, Davic Payne, who delighted the crowd with an elegart 15 runs.

For the fourth round we were privileged to play on one of the most superb cricket arenas in Australia. Only Blackburn North Baptists can provide a ground where first slip can rest on the fence between deliveries and deep mid-wicket can speńd a day in the field without touching the ball. In Russell's absence, Greg Stone was delegated the captaincy for the local derby. Next door neighbours Dave Hands and Greg Clark bowled tirelessly in the heat, taking $5 / 68$ and $3 / 86$ respectively. Chasing 253, we soon found ourselves $8 / 137$, enly the skipper (35) and Mark (30) getting a start. Jim however, had been saving himself for such a situation, and together with Andrew Hawkes added 83 runs before being dismissed for a fine 50. We finished just 30 runs short, but our confidence was regained.

The following week we met Trinity at Koonung Reserve and were dismissed for a disappointing 114, despite the presence of Edward Irons at no.9. Only Rob Hands (34) made a worthwhile contribution at the crease. At stumps Trinity were $0 / 44$ poised for a fairly easy victory the following Saturday. This however was not to be. Determined bowling and tight fielding swang the match back into our hands. All 10 wickets fell for just 60 runs as we suatched victory from the proverbial jaws of defeat. Dave Hands ( $20.5 / 3 / 51 / 6$ ) and Greg Clark (15/5/26/3) did most of tie danage, supported by Jim's three catches and inspired fielding from the rest of the team.
For round $\delta$ the ESCCA graciously provided a clown for our entertainment, who stayed on the ؟ield all day, of ten leaping out from behind the stumps at the bowlers end wish antics that led us fron uncontrolled laughter to utter despair. Rob Hands, Macca, Russell, Steve Pollard and Greg Stone all contributed 20 s in our total of $1: 1$, and later in the afternoon Dave Hands casually collected another six wickets as Blackburn Road went down in the heat.

Mark Droscnes came good with a devestating 74 against Koonung Heights in the next one-day sfectacle, supported by his old mate Brad Liddle (23). Koonung's captain had tetrs of frustration in his eyes, as he noved all his fieldsmen to the boundary in a last effort to curb the flow of runs. Dave, Brad and Steve shared the wickets as Koonung fell short of their target.

Three victories in succession and Dick suddenly re-appeared (Editors note: This was sheer coincidence) to take the reins from his younger brother. Burwood Utg. were nex to go. Contributions with the bat came from Dick (47) Brad(40) and Dave Hands (28).

At Highfield Road, an opening stand of 98 between the brothers Stone (Greg 57 Dick 36) Davič Hands return to form (50) and Andrew Hawkes' exciting innings set the local legends 264. David Hands ( $7 / 30$ ), Ed Irons $(3 / 31)$ and fine all round fielding timited Highfield to only 61 in their first attempt, and Russell Davison's figures of $10 / 2 / 27 / 9$ in Highfield's second innings speak for themselves.
North Balwy? with only 108 offered little resistance as the opening firm of Stone and Stone put on 97 in reply. Dick finished with 84 and was supported by 20s from Liddle, Davison and Phillips.

We went lat? last round against Koonung Salvos assured of a place in the finals and looking for some batting practice. Greg Clark (74) and Hawkesy (19) combined for an 80 partnership. Ross McDonald contributed a 22 and special guest artist Rod Towers made an intelligent 23 . Chasing 194 Koonung could only manage 142, with Greg Clark ( $5 / 50$ ) and Dave ( $3 / 54$ ) again in form. Jim made the most of a second innings with a powerful 36 not out.

Rob Hands discovered how difficult winning the toss is, and we took the field for the semi-final against the Barneys at the baseball ground. Unfortunately a back injury limited Clarky to only 3 overs, but Craig ( $2 / 63$ ) supported Handsy (4/51) to dismiss the Barneys for 239. Another Stone \& Stone stand of 75
got us off to a good start (Dick S4 \& Greg 28) fc11cwed up by Russel1 (20) Jim 53 ) and Drosh (21) to snatch victory in the dting minutes of the rain affected seccfld day. Press box typewriters were heard to be clicking furicusly as controversial selection Steven Smith skied his third delivery to midwicket.

On the opening day of the Grand Final, A11 Saints went down much easier than expected for only 154. Steve Smith ( $4 / 22$ ) and Craig ( $3 / 52$ ) being the main wicket takers. Unfortunately we too went Cown far nore easily than expected, falling just 6 runs short. Steve's 77 quietened the clicking typewriters. The final day seemed a mere formality, tut Dave Hands (2/32) bowled like a man possessed and the big Slug ( $6 / 67$ ) used flight, spin and bounce to dismiss a rather casuallooking All Saints for only 115 - throwing the game wide open. As Smith walked from the field after taking his tenth wicket for the match, the press box fell silent. Set 122 to win in 80 minutes, we edged, sliced turned, swung and flashed, but alas time was too short.

Congratulations to all players who contributed throughout the year, especially to David Hands ( 280 runs \& 45 wickets) Jim Phillips ( 284 runs \& 22 dismissals and Richard Stone (438 runs).

3rd XI REFORT The thirds did not fare too well at all in the 1980/81 seasan. finishing second last. This would not have been so bad, had we not lost seven of our nine matches outright (including a one day game).

In the past the thirds have been a valuable asset to the club allowing junior players to gain senior cricket experience before moving up into ' $A$ ' Grade and ' $C$ ' Grade teams. However this year it was more like a creche for those who had nothing better to do on Saturday afternoons. This applied more to the clder players who unfortunately did not set a good example to the younger Under 1 Gs .

Twenty-nine players represented "D"Grade this year, which was perhaps one of the reasons for us failing to function as a team properly. Batting was our main weakness being able to break the magical hundred only four times out of 17 innings. This dismal record could be attributed to the teams general attitude to batting which was to try and git every ball for six. Generally the bowling was good; quite of ten our bowlers set us up with a good chance of winning only to see it spoiled by irresponsible batting.
On, the brighter side, we did manage to clinch second last position with a big win over bottom side All Saints. Makrides and Petrovic were thestars capturing $4 / 24$ and $5 / 42$, and making 32 and is iespectively. A marathon innings from $U / 16$ Rod Hames and some delightful shots from Fierre Zattra pushed our score well past our target. Unfortunately this was our only success for the year.
$\mathrm{N}^{6} \mathrm{w}$ a quick run through of the teams main contributcrs:
John Miles was our main run scorer for the year compiling 175 runs. He was also a good team man and fancied himself as a bowler in the Doug Naiters mould (BOP) Stuart Hackett was our main bowler for most of the year sending down 73 overs. I'M sure that if he dropped his baseball approach to batting and became more orthodox in his approach he would be a very useful batsman in higher grades. David Makrides broke Ross Boucher's record for the most amount of money owed at the end of the season with $\$ 52$. But really we have a lot to thand Dave for namely getting a car but more importanty, introducing Lorraine to D Grade. She was quite popular with many of the players. However Dave did take the most wickets this season despite runup problems, and also played some servicable innings with the bat.
Stephen Down could by no means be described as an enthusiastic player, however Steve did prove to be a useful $\because$.ier. Alan Kosky never gave in. Alan was technically our best batsman $z^{*}$ showed a particular strength for legside shots. He was also a brilliant fieldsman in close and in the outfield. Alan has also said he wouldn't mind the job of captain. Alex Petrovic managed to squeeze in a few games between study committments, for which w were nost grateful. Al was a very awaward bowler to play and gave the batsmen a lot of trouble. He also showed some potential with the tat. Bruce Hollingsworth. Although Bruce does not have a licence he showed that he could drop wheelies as well as anyone else. Seriously though, Bruce was a capable cricketer lacking only in concentration. Although not blessed with a natural talent Pierre Zattra is a great trier who worked hard on his game, proving to be a handy bowler and hard hitting tailender. Mike Jansen was an U/16 who played every game, bowling batting and wicketkeeping. I think Mike would like us to remember hi's effort against Surwood where he carried his bat for 27 n.o. Chook (Darren Sencek) was another U/16 who whilst not playing many games, was quitg willing to be 12 th man, helping with scoring, fielding and umpiring. His big chance cane in the final round where he had $1 / 29$ off 10 overs. Unfortunately some rather poorly dressed cricketcr with the initials LM managed to drop three sitters off Chooks bowling at fine leg. I would also like to thank Hawkes, Lindeback, Chesterman, Morton, Hodges Hirley, Ferrari, Jetson, Droscher, Towers Walsh, Fontikis, Zele, Davies, Hames, Ircns ( $6 / 0 / 56 / 0$ ) Deckker etc for contributing this year. in $1980 / 81$ to form the nucleus of this year's Under 16 s . Add to this a couple of second year players and several welcome new faces and you have the ingredients for a successful Junior cricket team. Subtract one new face after Christmas, and take another one waterskiing and you end up losing the semi-final. Sad but true.

Kevin Wiegel started the season as captain, but one holiday led to another, and Ross McDonald soon took over the reins, performing creditably, revealing an understanding of the game and a cool temperament far beyond his years. (He must have learnt a lot from watching his $C$ grade skippers in action) Ross's batting continued to mature and he put together some very sensible knocks, particularly fine was his 69 against Blacky Road. His bowling varied from tight to embarassing (remember the twilight game?) depending on the state of his fragile back; but the best is yet to come - a star of the future.

Kevin produced two or three good innings and picked up 3 wickets on two occasions, but this interrupted season provided little indication of his real talents. Let's hope that next season will be Kevin Wiegel's big season.

A welcome sight at pre-season training was the tall upright figure of Steve Pollard, recruited by Macca for half a season. Steve did enough before Christmas to secure the bowling trophies, as well as adding some useful runs - without the eid of the hook and pull. Steve has gone to Canberra to accumulate his first million - watch for his nane in the Prime Minister's XI.

After just one Italian lesson, Peter Ferrari rejoined his Aussic mates but it took him until the 8 th round to find some sort of form with the bat when he produced a valuable 32 against Trinity. Fortunately Fat came gocd with the ball a bit sooner, and in an excellent spell of parabolic swing bowling captured $6 / 12$. Max Walker and Lance Cairns predict a big future for this lad.

Alan Roodhouse put in a useful allround season producing runs when they were most needed. His 25 in our thrilling 5 run victory over Trinity and his 26 in the seni were particularly impressive under pressure. Alan also proved a handy change bowler with an ability to cut the ball, and a courageous shortleg fieldsman.
Dave Shaw hit peak form in the fourth round against Ashburton when he peeded off an exhilirating 82 with 16 fours (the season's highest individual total). He also turred in a orilliant 4 balls in the final game to grab 2 for 0 . Dave's keeping was again steady and he held most of the fev chances which came his way.

Michael Jansen retained the title of most casual batsman this season, narrowly defeating fat for the third successive seascn. Apart from that Michael achieved littive eise at the crease in a dissagointing season on which he can only (and will) improve. Mike saved his longest and most successful spell with the ball for the semi when in a tight12 overs ranging from medium-slow to slowmediun he collected 4 for 40 .
Roger Deckket always looked good, but for various reasons failed to fulfil his potential with the bat. He did manage to produce one match winning effort however, with â fine 17 x against Trinity in the rail biting finish at Willison West, including one of his famous lof ted irives.
Darfen Sencek was lured to the club at great expense this season, but whether we got our mone?s worth from Chook is anybody's guess. One or two great grabs in the field, 3 wickets and a top score of 7 is not exactly the sort of cricket that sets the turnstiles clicking, but to be fair, he did attract a couple of new spectators - his mum and dad.

International soccer star Craig Davidson gave up his valuable Saturday dribbling practice to play cricket with us this season and showed that he could handle the smaller ball asxwell. An asset in the field, Craigs batting rose to Ereat heights also when he was promoted to open the innings against Blacky Rd and collected his highest score - a devestating 10 including a 3 and a 2.

Relieved of the keeping glotes this year. Rod Hames excelled in the field with his dependable midoff and midon fielding - and catching. He surprised everyone - even himself- in the final round with a brilliant catch at short midwicket which had four written all over it the noment it left the bat.

Ton Pontikis - the man with a cousip oj uncle in every suburb of Melbourne - didn't have many chances with the bat, and was a doubtful quantity even in the field early on, preferring to jog alongside the ball and keep it company on its long journey to the boundary. however the 5th of December 1980 was Tommy's day, for not only did he take an mazing catch and an ordinary catch, but he also took a catch of his own bowling: Incredible but true.

Last but by no means least we come to one of the great originals in contemporary cricket - Adrian Unpronouncable Zele. Adrian spent most of the season developing a new method of catching a cricket ball - a method devised to save wear and tear on the hands, but with the added advantage of keeping footballers in touch during the off season. For 'caught Zele' please read 'chest marked Zele'. Adrian's runup continued to generate more pace than his bowling.
