By being slack with your payments of subs you not only make the committees task difficult, but you also create the situation wherein the club is being supported by only a limited number of its members. If your mates have paid up, why shouldn't you.

Social events and functions are arranged for your benefit, and as a means of raising funds to supplement the income provided by subs. They are a necessary part of the club's activities, and need your support. Next time you complain about the practice equipment just think for a moment - have you paid your subs? Have you put into the club as much as you are taking out?
