

Annual Report 1982/83 "A" GRADE REPORT The first XI's season was a frustrating one. The loss of several more experienced players from the previous season probably contributed to our disappointing performances in the early games, when a lack of batting discipline let us down badly. Not even with last season's batting heroes Blake and Brodtmann at the top of the order could we get within striking distance of 200. In the field we were able to match our opponents for the most part, but lacked the ability to finish off an innings after early success with the ball. Against Nth Balwyn and Blackburn South/Bennettswood we had captured five wickets for around fifty, yet somehow managed to let them off the hook. Against the Barnys our biggest problem was finishing off the opening stand: When we finally topped the 200 mark in the last round before Christmas against ladder leaders Hartwell, we were quietly confident, however we somehow let that one slip away from us too.

Totals of 150-175, while of little value in a two day game, proved to be just enough in the one-day rounds, and following up our batting with accurate bowling and tight fielding, we achieved successive wins. A couple of hot afternoons against Richmond with a depleted team produced a disappointing result, but we bounced back with an exciting win against Trinity at Koonung. Despite growing confidence we finished the season off as we started with a loss, this time at the hands of Deepdene. The generally poor results achieved by the team this season were offset to some extent by encouraging individual performances - particularly from the younger players. This augers well for the future of the First XI.

Dr.R.O.Blake, due to circumstances beyond his control was unable to contribute as consistently as we would have liked this year, and was only able to show glimpses of his mercurial skills with bat and ball. A fine 75 against Trinity showed the Doc in the kind of innings we needed every match. Although Ron took five wickets on three occasions, his most impressive bowling effort was probably his 2/63 from 23 overs against Blacky South, where he had the ball beating everything and anything including Johnno and Kenno.

For the first time in his illustrious career, Broddy found out this year what it's like to struggle for runs - and the team suffered as a consequence. To make things worse, the cause of his problem could not readily be pinpointed. With a forty and five innings in the thirties, Broddy's main problem would seem to have been overcoming the concentration lapses which prevented him from going on to a big score. Although he has lately learnt that batting, like life, wasn't meant to be easy, Broddy is big enough to bounce back next season. The less said about his pair of GOLDEN DUCKS against Wyclif the better.

Greg (You're the boy) Clark, with bikie-like toughness, overcame a nagging back injury this season to produce some fine bowling performances - none better than his 5/64 in the opening round. Often bowling with considerable pace and disconcerting bounce, Greg frequently seemed to lack that extra ounce of luck, and spent much of his time watching good balls flying through; just wide or over slips that might well have gone to hand (or stayed there!). As a batsman, Greg continued to improve, developing into a reliable and entertaining scorer of thirties. His keeping to wrong-uns was admirable.

Evergreen Russell Davison, became the club's longest serving player this season, and was as always a welcome inclusion in the team when available. Several useful hands, particularly in the troublesome No.3 spot were very timely and demonstrated well the way in which to build an innings. A pity he wasn't around every match to contribute with his experience and team spirit.

Dave (Get a bag) Hands was one of the big improvers this season, finally emerging from the shadow of his big brother, and shaking off the "Poor Man's Peter Burke" tag which has dogged him for years, Dave showed the makings (in the last two rounds at any rate) of an "A" Grade allrounder. Switching back to bowl into the wind this season Dave produced some tight bowling spells and despite a few problems with the inswinger proved, after Blakey, our most successful bowler. A fine unbeaten sixty against Trinity was a little gem of an innings. The less said about his fielding the better - the only thing Dave is guaranteed to catch is the flu.

Andrew Hawkes forced his way into the Firsts for the opening round and celebrated with a brilliant on-drive for four. With yet another four in Round 5 against the Barneys, he would seem to have cemented his place in the side, but no, Andrew was dropped for the next round. Andrew's most memorable achievement with the bat this season came at Highfield Park, when he provided solid, unconquered resistance to a Wyclif attack hell bent on obtaining an outright victory. As a square-leg fieldsman he continued to provide an impenetrable barrier, as a bowler...well two wickets in as many balls against the unsuspecting Barneys says it alled

Ross McDonald (Macca) faced a difficult task in his first full Senior season, being asked to open the batting on most occasions - often against opponents much bigger than himself. That Ross did so without complaint in the knowledge that he would be required to sacrifice his natural game for the team's interests, is a clear indication of his mature attitude to the game. Ross's concentration and determination to do his best with the bat provided a fine example for the rest of the team.

Jim (Let's fix his little red wagon) Phillips continued to keep the team on its collective toes this season with his boundless enthusiasm and considered, constructive comments on all aspects of the game. As a wicket keeper Jim was his usual efficient self, but as a batsman he experienced a rather lean season. Constantly hampered by a captain's error which saw him batting in the wrong position, the Grub with Gloves was unable to show his stuff until the final round when a new found confidence resulted in an excellent seventy in adverse conditions. Needs to improve his driving.

Greg (Penguin) Stone returned from self-imposed exile during the season and proceeded to pick up where he left off, working the ball onto the on-side for a single. His brother had a disappointing season, blaming pressure of thinking about work (a new experience) for his miserable post-Christmas efforts.

After an early struggle with the selectors, the last but not least of the fabulous Walsh trio, Robby (alias Stan alias Charlie) settled into the firsts. Unfortunately 1982/83 did not prove to be one of the most memorable seasons for this talented little performer. Only on a couple of occasions did young Rob show his worth with the bat, producing particularly a fighting fifty against Richmond. With only limited opportunities at the bowling crease he found it difficult to slip into top gear, but he did manage to produce the ball of the series to bowl out Gary the Great. On the debit side, Rob actually dropped a catch during the ninth round (Day 1,5,27pm)

A surprise return to the team by the little maestro, Ted Walsh, during a lull in the Pioneers Pre-Season training program was most welcome. Along with his invaluable experience, Ted added a necessary edge of competitiveness to the team. Whether contributing with the bat or the ball, Ted always provided a fine example for the youngsters. His gutsy half century against Deepdene was a classic example. Ted also led by example in the rooms after the game.

Glenn Weatherley showed glimpses of form during the season, but unfortunately only showed glimpses of himself. Craig Rowbotham paced himself skilfully, gradually building up to peak fitness before actually taking the ball in Round 5. By Round 7, Craig was firing on all cylinders and captured a match winning 4 wickets against Canterbury/Mt.Albert. After being that for a six a fortnight later he mysteriously disappeared. Steve Warren proved a useful member of the team on several occasions supporting his teammates with courageous and sensible batting. David Oswin, Tony Owen and Mark Spencer made guest appearances, while Darren Baker chipped in to catch Jimmy Hunt. Tony and Byrney only thought about it.

Thanks to all players for contributing towards an enjoyable, if only moderately successful season, and for their support and co operation.

Well, its that time of the year again. Break out the moth balls and put the cricket gear out of mind and sight until next season. Our post season conference is over, excuses offered and plans of better things to come next year have been temporarily shelved. Our grand final debacle certainly took the edge off what has been a good season for us. I say it was a good season, but once again we just weren't good enough. To win a premiership after finishing on top of the ladder would have been most gratifying, but as has been the case in years gone by we simply don't always play consistently well when we have to. Possibly one reason for our defeat in the grand final was that we were still on a 'high' after thrashing Kerrimuir in the semi-final. The Baptists were a good class and a half above Kerrimuir and I feel that we took it for granted that victory would come our way, though not quite as easily.

Since our encounter against the Baptists late in the season they included a couple of batsmen who would have been nicely suited to 'B' Grade level. Aside from those two, I have no doubt that we could have matched them, as anybody who saw the game could tell you, once they were removed, the opposition looked ordinary. Our dismal batting performance did not do our team justice and I'm sure that next year we will show our true colours and give the Baptists a well deserved hiding.

Dl has functioned well as a team this year, the most noteable difference being everybody chipping in to do the work. As Captain of the team, it was most encouraging to turn up each Saturday knowing that there were ten other people willing to sacrifice a bit of pre-match relaxation to help prepare the ground and generally assist in doing 'the dirty work'. Because of this eminant enthusiasm, it is obvious why we had good attendance at practice, players prepared to put more into their game and reap the benefits of mateship and good performances on the field. Though we failed to make the finals in D2 last season, we were promoted to D1.

It is a measure of our success at practice and improved performances in competition that we finished this season clearly on top of the ladder. Our scorebook shows this season with 7 victories (3 outright) and 3 defeats (1 outright), finals not included for obvious reasons.

TEAM CHAMPION: - Mike Jansen. Once again Mike has shown he has got what it takes. Last years winner, he has again shown his ability with some strong performances both with bat and ball. He has bowled consistently well this year, always being amongst the wickets, but most noteably, his batting has improved. Having the task of opening bat and opening bowler is by no means easy, but capping off a season by winning Team Champion shows just how dedicated to the cause Mike is. Sometimes his reluctance to face the opening deliveries causes concern, but that concern soon disappears once he takes to the crease. Together with 'Chook' he has provided us with a more reliable opening partnership than last year, and we all know the importance of an opening partnership.

Moving up to D1; the standard of opposition has been higher, but Mike still managed to snare 33 scalps at an average of 18.5 runs. A well deserved award.

BATTING AWARD:- Who Else, Glen Newnham. His expertise, his cool style and command of the bat was a more than welcome asset to the club this year, and I hope we can look forward to many more fine innings from this left hander. Undoubtedly, his batting strength bolstered our performances this year and without him the going would have been much harder. Simply the knowledge that there was a team member who could score runs with such apparent ease just waiting to attack the bowling gave everybody else confidence, an integral part of cricket. When called upon, he has also proved to be a useful swing bowler, picking up 10 wickets this season. He has amassed 451 runs at an average of 41. He has always displayed enthusiasm and is a popular member of our team. Well done Sir.

MOST CONSISTENT: - Stephen Down. This has been a good year for Steve. Apart from one lapse when he forgot to stop playing cards, Downy has been a willing performer. His unusual tactic of bowling around the wicket often has opponents in trouble. When you couple this with his ability to swing the ball, he proved a difficult customer. He captured 29 wickets at an average of 20.1. Together with Mike Jansen, they proved to be a very successful opening attack, 62 wickets between them is no mean feat. Downy showed us this year that he CAN bat. His most memorable innings were against Richmond where he notched up 88 very quick runs, and the following game against the Baps, when he clouted Sprake for 32 runs in one over. Needless to say, Sprake was taken out of the attack at the end of the over.

MOST IMPROVED: This award has been won by Darren 'Chook' Sencek. For those of you who would care to look at our statistics, Chooks batting has improved quite appreciably over this season and reached a milestone when he cracked it for a ton in the semi-final against the hapless Kerrimuir boys. It just shows, you can convert a batsman who has very little technique, threaten him with the axe, then see him transform into a majestic stroke maker. If Chook can maintain this restraint, he will make many more runs for this club. As mentioned earlier, he and Mike Jansen have gradually improved their opening pertnerships and I'm sure that they will only progress.

Now for the 'also rans'. Irongloves had a slight improvement behind the stumps this season. Ever since his birthday present was presented to him, his keeping improved in leaps and bounds. Most noteable improvement was that he reduced 'byes' dramatically. The cousins, Hackett and Weekes. Well, they showed promise, but unfortunately what was promised didn't always eventuate. Stuart picked up 18 wickets for the season, but occasionally had trouble with approaching the stumps. Once the problem was ironed out he proved to be a valuable bowler. Towards the end of the season, Stuart really started to put his act together with the bat, and next year will do well. Matt Weekes hit a purple patch mid season but alas, lost touch towards the end. Practice makes perfect, and we all look forward to a return to form by Matthew. When he was making runs he looked impressive. Solid, hard hitting Alan Kosky didn't play every game this season, but made many useful contributions with some superb fielding displays. A big score was always on the cards from Al, but as is often the case he would receive an unbeatable delivery and be dismissed just as things looked rosy.

Kiernan Rowbotham, although he has announced his retirement from first class competition was probably our most regular member at practice. Despite the fact that he didn't always fare well, he was always willing to have a go. Keep trying Keirnan, one day the break will come. Who will forget the semi when Keirnan casually removed D.K's middle peg with an orthodox straight delivery. If there was a grand stand at the ground, it would have erupted. For that spectacular incident, Keirnan received more back slaps than he would have on a swedish massuers table. What about our ace driver Woody? This promising stock car driver kindly donated his services to cricket on a couple of occasions and if he persists, should develop into a useful middle order batsman. Time will tell. In the last game before the finals, Woody took a couple of telling catches which had the pundits reeling in amazement. Our head dietician, Adrian Zele, who OWES ME \$6.00 FOR A PIZZA was also on the verge of being classed a good ordinary player. I don't know if he has a particular hate for Kerrimuir, but the two times we played them were the two times Zele struck form. It appears that we may have lost Adrian to the dainty sport of squash, but any time he wants to bring his 'Guests Teddy Bears Biscuits' and 'Cheezels' back, he is welcome. Ron Ashleys departure mid season left a hole in the batting and also the loss of a willing worker, but we still finished on top.

I would like to thank my team mates for their support during the season. Having team mates that I can rely upon, I was able to concentrate on my own game a bit more and my performances duly improved as the scorebooks reveal. Finally, to those parents, friends and families who came along to support us at various stages of the season, a special thank you. Your interest in our team gave us just that little bit more incentive to do well. We certainly hope that you were entertained by our antics and trust that you will support us again next season.
