TREASURER'S REPORT

The 1986/87 season has consolidated our financial situation. Going into the current season we had a bank balance of \$746.39 and by the end of March we had accumulated just enough funds to top the grand. With the club requiring two new sets of mats substantial revenue will have to be generated early next season.

FIRST XI REPORT

Like a certain VFL club in recent years, the First XI seemed to be suffering from the "Don't Know How to Win" Syndrome during the 1986/87 season. It wasn't until Round 5 that we were able to register our first winning points, and a further 4 rounds passed before our tally received its next worthwhile boost. Statistics show that we ended the season with just 2 wins. But were we really that bad?

No! I here you cry in unison. No NBMCC First XI could be that bad. Well, what actually happened during 1986/87? I shall endeavour to read

between the lines in the scorebooks.

Climatic factors seriously disrupted the opening rounds and both matches ended in stalemates. Following our marvellous victory in the final round of 1985/86, we were eager to repeat the dose against Wex and Franky in our first outing of the new season. Unfortunately for us rain on the first day prevented our gaining

more than three points.

In Round 3 the entire team came down with a dose of the dreaded Hands disease and with 9 of our batsmen scoring between 10 and 17, the innings never really took off. Our very ordinary total was comfortably overhauled by St.Silas, although for the second successive match the ball was barely in danger of being bruised at any stage by our opponents. Clarky's 17 overs netted 7 wickets - the final 6 coming in just 8 overs for a mere 27

runs. And Wogg took out his first TFC (reluctantly!).

Round 6 brought us face to face with the competition's egotistical ladder leaders - Canterbury Mont Albert. Another ordinary batting effort gained us 177 runs and more than our fair share of sledging and smartalec comments from Mahon's minions. 
Languishing at the lower end of the B1 ladder was not something we


S. (Gus) WARREN
