









This was the "freak" catch which dismissed England opener David Sheppard on the last day of the Fourth Test in Adelaide yesterday.

Off the first ball from Ken ("Slasher") Mackay's first over of the innings, Sheppard went to drive, but edged the ball just wide of Benaud, at second slip.

Benaud hit the ball into the air with his first attempt at the eatch. Simpson jumped forward, but, before he—could reach the ball, Benaud knocked it up a second time.

GROUT, seeing that both were likely to miss, leapt from behind the stumps, OVER the falling Simpson, and, grabbed the ball inhis right hand (arrowed) inches from the ground.








TRUEMAN, nearest at left, takes a catch on the run to dismiss Simpson for 32 off the bowling of Titmus.











